I am very fortunate that both of my parents are still living today. It was a surprise when I had a call to pursue my studies at the seminary. I was very grateful that my childhood dreams of becoming a priest could be realized.

My intention of becoming priest developed when I was at the age of seven. I was always captivated by how the priest celebrated the sacrament of Holy Eucharist during the Mass. It really inspired me at this early age. Perhaps I discussed my desire of becoming a holy priest in the future with my elder once. In the family, we always devoted ourselves to praying the Holy Rosary, Divine Mercy and other prayers of the Catholic Church. And of course, we were always active in every church organized activity. My mom was a faithful Legion; she always devoted most of her life for prayer and charity work. She often prays that one of us three boys will be study at the seminary to become a priest. All of a sudden the call to the priesthood was revealed in me. She was a very proud mother and always supporting my priesthood vocation.

When I grew up and went to school, I was still faithful and focused on my ambition of becoming a priest. The positive aspects: my life was completely changed from what I used to be in the past. From the most aggressive and short tempered person to a humble and generous hearted person.
